Regroup all of its clinics in order to forge closer ties between medical specialties and to organize health care in a more integrated and accessible way.

These past few years, it has become crucial to encourage ambulatory care. This combining of clinics in one area will improve the health care experience and reduce waiting lists. The modernized and expanded ambulatory units will offer face-to-face care in-house and virtual care for remote patients, the latter resulting from improvements in telehealth. Telehealth enable remote consultations for several patients, so fewer trips for them and physicians.
