The Roses Radiothon is a unifying event that aims to improve services in the fight against cancer. Each year, the funds raised are invested at the Chaleur Regional Hospital to improve patient care and services, as well as support the campaigns in the Acadian Peninsula.

Over the years, we have invested more than 1.3 million dollars in several pieces of equipment for the screening, intervention and treatment sectors and \$716,476 for the facilities in the Acadian Peninsula.

THIS YEAR, THE ROSES RADIOTHON IS AIMING TO RAISE OVER \$150,000

1 PREVENTION AND DIAGNOSTIC-AUDIOLOGY

Side effects of chemotherapy treatments can vary depending on the person, medication used and medication dosage. Side effects of certain medications include hearing loss and/or ringing in the ears in the absence of any source of sound, which are caused by damage to the inner ear structures. The funds raised as part of the Roses Radiothon will be used to purchase two different pieces of equipment for the Audiology Department to help prevent and diagnose these side effects in patients receiving chemotherapy.

3 HOSPITAL FOUNDATIONS OF THE ACADIAN PENINSULA

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In addition to supporting the Roses Radiothon, the foundations of the Acadian Peninsula will also be supporting their respective campaigns. Of the amounts raised in their areas, 20 percent will go toward the Roses Radiothon to support the fight against cancer at our regional hospital and 80 percent will go toward their needs.

2 DIAGNOSTIC - SURGICAL SUITE AND GASTROENTEROLOGY

Intestinal polyps are benign tumours of the colon and rectum. Thanks to the Roses Radiothon, the gastroenterology sector will be able to acquire a second cutting-edge piece of equipment which is used to remove these intestinal polyps.

In the Surgical Suite, the addition of the MyoSure procedure will make it possible to remove uterine polyps and any other uterine tissue via the hysteroscopic route. The advanced technology that this equipment offers will make it possible to treat more complex cases and to shorten procedures.

A polyp is an abnormal growth on the lining of a mucous membrane. There are several types of polyps: some do not evolve and will always remain benign, while others are likely to develop into cancerous tumours.
